Jay Carney



Press Secretary

Carney was *Time's* Washington bureau chief before becoming VP Joe Biden's Communications Director in 2009. Carney left his position after more than three years as Press Secretary.

Sylvia Burwell



Director, Office of Management and Budget Burwell, a veteran of the Clinton administration, previously held top positions at the Bill and

Melinda Gates Foundation and the Walmart Foundation.

Alyssa Mastromonaco



Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations Mastromonaco started off as the scheduler in Obama's Senate office. Obama reportedly seeks Alyssa when he "thinks his life is out of control."

Where They Are Now

After working briefly as a political analyst for CNN, Carney took a position as the Senior Vice President of Corporate Affairs at Amazon. Carney had to defend the company against a New York Times story that condemned Amazon's work environment. Carney was considered for PR positions with Uber and Apple.

Burwell is now the Secretary of Health and Human Services, where she oversees over 77,000 employees. She has led a "Healthy Self" campaign, devoted to connecting people to the care they need. Recently, Burwell was in Flint, Michigan directing the administration's recovery effort after the water crisis.

Mastromonaco now serves as the Chief Operating Officer of Vice. Vice, based in Brooklyn, started as a free punk magazine in Montreal 20 years ago and has since expanded into digital media, television and film. It now operates in 36 countries.

Replacement

Josh Earnest



Earnest, who was Obama's lowa Communications Director in 2007, succeeded Carney in 2014. Earnest previously served as Principal Deputy White House Press Secretary.

Shaun Donovan



Prior to OMB, Donovan served as the 15th Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, where he managed the Department's \$47 billion budget.

Anita Breckenridge



Before joining the White House, Ms. Breckenridge served as chief of staff at the National Endowment for the Arts, where she worked since the start of the administration.

Susan Rice

National Security Advisor

Rice was initially the leading candidate to succeed Hillary Clinton as Secretary of State, but withdrew her name from consideration after GOP Senators criticized her remarks in the days following the attack on Benghazi, promising a lengthy confirmation process. Previously to her role as National Security Advisor, Rice served as Ambassador to the UN.



John Brennan

Director of the CIA

Brennan served in CIA for 25 years and lead the Analysis Corporation, a private intelligence business as CEO and President. Brennan was forced to withdraw the first time he was tagged for CIA director in 2008 due to a media maelstrom over his alleged role in permitting the use of "enhanced interrogation techniques" as a top CIA official in the Bush administration.

Time Since 2013

As National Security Advisor Rice was not able to fully leave behind the Benghazi scandal, testifying before the House Select Committee on Benghazi. Rice was a proponent of the Iran nuclear deal, calling it the "most comprehensive and effective" nuclear plan ever. Her vocal support for the deal drew criticism from Israel lobbyists. Rice has made a trade agreement with Asia-Pacific nations, development projects in Africa, and gay rights overseas some of her priorities.

Brennan faced a public controversy when Senator Diane Feinstein accused the CIA of spying on the senate, which Brennan initially denied, and later apologized for. Brennan has also voiced strong support for the use of drones. He also has denounced Edward Snowden on several occasions, suggesting that the leaking of government secrets abetted the November 2015 terrorist attacks in Paris.

McDonough and Valerie Have Become Two of Obama's Longest-Serving Advisors

Denis McDonough Chief of Staff

McDonough has served Obama for over a decade, beginning with his senatorial election in 2004, and he served as Deputy National Security Adviser. McDonough was anointed Chief of Staff at only age 43. Former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) commented that McDonough shares a temperament with the President: "The person Denis reminds me most of? Barack Obama." Obama has had more Chiefs of Staff than any other President, but McDonough has been by far Obama's longest serving Chief of Staff, and is considered Obama's favorite. McDonough is known establishing a "no drama" work atmosphere and favoring an attention to detail, spending hours on tasks previous chiefs delegated.



Valerie Jarret

National Security Advisor

Jarret has known Obama since 1991, when she offered first lady Michele a job in Chicago's City Hall. Since then, Jarret has remained a very close personal ally to the President and is known for being involved in many of Obama's most important decisions. "Her role since she has been at the White House is one of the broadest and most expansive roles that I think has ever existed in the West," said Obama's former communications director Anita Dunn.
