
Senators Reveal Compromise on Criminal Justice Reform Legislation in Hopes of Reaching the Floor

Analysis

- The original version of the bill passed the Senate
 Judiciary Committee in October, but some
 conservatives worried the bill was not tough enough on
 criminals with violent criminal records
- The compromise might not satisfy all Republicans but it has swayed a handful
- The revisions now say that criminals with a serious violent felony will not receive reduced mandatory minimum sentences, and it adds enhanced mandatory sentences for crimes involving an opioid drug
- The next step for supporters of the bill is to persuade Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) to take up the legislation this year
