
House and Senate Appropriations Committees Pass Defense Spending Bills

Includes Base and Overseas Contingency Operations Funding in Billions of Dollars



Reasons Behind White House Veto and House OCO Base Budget Funding

The House defense bills have shifted more base budget funding into the OCO fund to sustain higher levels of military personnel and equipment.

The House argues these increased numbers are necessary to address increased national security threats like ISIL and Russian aggression.

Currently, the House's OCO funding covers overseas operations only through April 2017 instead of the full fiscal year. This lack of full funding for overseas operations has resulted in the White House threatening to veto the House bill.


