Details of the Tax and Who It Would Affect



The Homeless and Housing Impact Technology Tax

- Introduced by Supervisor Eric Mar and co-sponsored by Supervisors Aaron Peskin and David Campos, the Homeless and Housing Impact Technology Tax, referred to as the Tech Tax, would impose a 1.5% payroll tax to workers in tech companies
- The tax is estimated to amount to \$120 million in annual revenue, and would be used to aid the city's homelessness problem and the housing "affordability crisis"
- In order for the measure to appear on the ballot, it will need the approval of at least **six of the eleven** San Francisco supervisors, who could vote on the initiative as early as August



Why is the Tax Being Proposed?

- The rising housing costs in San Francisco that have left some locals in difficult situations have been attributed in part to the influx of employees in the tech industry
- Five years ago, some tech companies accepted what was labeled the "Twitter tax break," where they were offered a break from payroll taxes to move to a part of Market Street in an effort to revitalize the area
- TIME reports that as these new shops moved into the area, nonprofits and poorer residents were "pushed out"



Who Will Be Affected By the Tax?

- Tech companies located in San Francisco with gross receipts of \$1 million of greater will susceptible to the tax, including **Twitter**, **Salesforce**, and **Zendesk**
- Employees working in **Silicon Valley** would not be affected
- UC Hastings College of the Law Professor Leo Martinez has noted that **drawing the line on what would be considered a "tech" company** under this tax would be a complicated process
