An Overview of Clinton's Latest Ads

Everything

Clinton's ad, "Everything," represents her latest attempt to court black voters. The spot highlights Trump Management being charged with discriminating against African Americans and depicts moments of violence against black protesters at Trump's rallies.



Role Models

Clinton's campaign makes an emotional appeal in "Role Models," the ad set to air in Arizona as part of Clinton's latest six-figure ad buy. The 60-second spot includes clips of Trump's most controversial statements playing on the news as children watch.



Hat

Playing upon Trump's famous "Make America Great Again" hat, this ad target's Trump on the economy. It accuses him of outsourcing his jobs and products to 12 different countries and maintains the need to keep jobs in America in order to make it truly great again.

Background

- Clinton's campaign has outspent Trump on general election ad buys by \$67 million since her ads first hit the airwaves two months ago
- Trump's first ad aired on August 19
- In a sign of confidence, Clinton's campaign has begun running ads in solid red states such as Arizona
- Priorities USA, Clinton's largest super PAC, is collaborating with The Latino Victory Project, El Super Pac Voto Latino, and People for the American Way's "Latino Vote!" on the release of over \$3 million of Spanish language ads in Florida and Nevada



Survey Results: Should Third Party Candidates Debate?

Morning Consult, August 29 – 30



- The Commission on Presidential Debates holds a candidate must be constitutionally eligible, show evidence of ballot access, and maintain an average of 15 percent of the vote in five national polls
- A third party candidate has not been allowed on the debate stage since 1992 when Ross Perot joined George H.W. Bush and Bill Clinton
- In such an unusual election year, about half of those surveyed maintained third party candidates should be allowed to debate



Trump Recommits to Hard-Line Immigration Stances

Donald Trump's 10-Point Immigration Plan

1. **Build a wall** with surveillance and sensor technology, fortified with manpower.



6. Suspend issuing visas to any place we cannot adequately screen including countries with refugees like Syria and Libya.



2. End "catch and release" by detaining anyone who crosses the border until they are deported.



7. Require other countries to take back their citizens when they are deported. Some countries refuse to accept people back in such circumstance.



3. **Enforce zero tolerance for criminal aliens** by removing them all from the U.S. and creating a Deportation Task Force.



8. Complete the biometric entry-exit visa tracking system in an effort to eliminate Visa overstays.



4. **Block funding for sanctuary cities** in an effort to eliminate laws that shield undocumented immigrants.



9. Use E-Verify to the fullest extent, expanding its use and prioritizing the deportation of aliens on welfare.



5. Cancel Obama's executive orders giving amnesty and fully enforce all immigration laws.




10. **Reform legal immigration** to keep it legal immigration within historical norms and admit immigrants most likely to be financially self-sufficient.

- There are 11 swing states in the 2016 election: Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Michigan, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Wisconsin
- In a four way race, Real Clear Politics averages show Trump tied in Wisconsin
- Fox's latest poll shows Clinton leading Trump by 2 percentage points nationally, 41% to 39%
