









- After avoiding the question, Portman has declared that he will support Donald Trump in the general election



#### Hotline's 2016 Senate rankings





7. North Carolina: Richard Burr (R)

8. Ohio: Robert Portman (R)

9. Florida: Marco Rubio (R)

10. Missouri + Arizona: Roy Blunt (R) + John McCain (R)

1. Illinois: Sen. Mark Kirk (R) is trailing in polls in a blue state, and is lacking in support from outside spending groups. Kirk has publicly disavowed Trump in a TV ad, seeking to distance himself from his party.

Incumbent: Mark Kirk (R)

Challenger: Tammy Duckworth (D)

2. Wisconsin: Former Senator Russ Feingold (D) is running an aggressive campaign against Ron Johnson (R), but Johnson has ample support from outside spending groups.

Incumbent: Ron Johnson (R)

Challenger: Former Sen. Russ Feingold (D)

3. Indiana: Evan Bayh, a former Indiana Governor and Senator, entered the race late with considerable campaign funding from previous races and strong name recognition.

Incumbent: Dan Coats (R) (retiring)

Challengers: Former Gov. Evan Bayh (D) and Rep. Todd Young (R)

**4. New Hampshire :** New Hampshire voters tend to be more in tune with politics than the average voter so Trump will likely have less of a down-ballot impact on Ayotte than in other states. However, Ayotte has been trailing in the polls.

*Incumbent: Kelly Ayotte (R)* 

Challenger: Gov. Maggie Hassan (D)

5. Pennsylvania: National Democrats spent \$5 million to get their chosen candidate, 2014 gubernatorial candidate Katie McGinty (D), through a messy nominating fight. Pat Toomey (R) has a lot of money to spend in his effort to brand himself as independent from his party.

> Incumbent: Pat Toomey (R) Challenger: Katie McGinty (D)
