

## Congress overrides President Obama's veto of JASTA, allowing U.S. families to sue Saudi Arabia over 9/11

## Why was the bill vetoed?

- This bill would amend the US judicial code and narrow the scope of foreign sovereign immunity offered under the Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act
- President Obama vetoed the bill because he believed other countries could retaliate and pass similar laws allowing their citizens to sue U.S. troops or corporations for activities in their countries
- This is the first time Congress has overrode President Obama's veto
