## **Key topics in the discussions with the Senate committees**

Nominees point to what action they will take in their agencies, answer Senator's questions

Ryan Zinke	Scott Pruitt	Rick Perry
<ul> <li>Zinke asserted he would try to balance conservation with the use of public lands and waters</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>If he can, Pruitt will want to reform or repeal the Waters of the United States rule that defines and protects federal waterways</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Perry said he regrets earlier comments about eliminating the DOE, and would protect its mission if confirmed</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Differing from conservative orthodoxy, Zinke stressed the federal ownership of public lands and the need for federal funding for preservation</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Sen. Lindsay Graham (R-SC) announced he will support Pruitt, despite being one of the few Republican senators who support policies that fight climate change</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Perry stated he would defend DOE programs for renewables, fossil fuels, advance nuclear energy, and research and development</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>One of his priorities would be addressing an estimated \$12.5 billion backlog of maintenance work for national parks</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>He believes that the EPA has an obligation to regulate carbon dioxide due to a 2007 Supreme Court case and 2009 finding</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>He asserted his commitment to advocating for economics and scientific research, and the connection between science and economics</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Zinke wants to move towards energy independence, and supports drilling, mining and logging on federal land</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>He implied he would devolve some regulatory authority of the EPA to the states</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Democratic senators were pleased that he seems to be a counterweight to the Trump administration's planned funding cuts</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Actions he wants to take include ending the moratorium on coal mining leases on federal land and repealing the methane venting and flaring rule</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Pruitt did not want to discuss his personal views on climate change or his decision to drop a lawsuit against Arkansas after receiving donations from executives in the poultry industry</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>According to a recent article in The Hill Trump's team is considering rolling back DOE funding and cutting certain programs, and Perry tried to distance himself from the cuts</li> </ul>

All three energy and environment nominees broke from Trump's stance on climate change as a hoax, and instead they said they believed in climate change but would need more research to determine the pace of change and the extent that it is manmade.
