In his first 100 days, Trump has reversed campaign positions on NATO, China, Russia and Syria

Where does President Trump stand on key foreign policy issues?

NATO: During his campaign, President Trump expressed many doubts about NATO; however, after a joint appearance with NATO's secretary-general, President Trump reversed his position.

Syria: After the Assad regime used chemical weapons, President Trump reversed his position of non-intervention in Syria and authorized a strike on a Syrian airbase. Members of his administration have hinted the US might support regime change in the future.

Iraq: Officially, there are 5,200 US troops in Iraq, not counting those deployed on a "temporary basis." The Trump administration has stopped releasing information about the size and nature of US troop deployment in Iraq and Syria to maintain an element of surprise in their efforts to defeat ISIL. **Russia**: President Trump has reassessed his support of Russia after learning of their suspected complicity in the Assad regime's use of chemical weapons in April.

> North Korea: Vice-President Mike Pence declared an end to the Obama-era strategy of strategic patience, shortly after a US Navy strike group was redirected to the western Pacific Ocean near the Korean peninsula as a show of force.

China: After President Xi Jinping's April visit to Mar-A-Lago, Trump walked back his accusations that China manipulates its currency, which is likely part of a deal made to solicit Chinese support in containing North Korea.

Iran: Trump has been a vocal critic of the Iran deal since his campaign. Secretary Tillerson announced the administration was initiating a comprehensive review of the deal.
