Analysis

- Republicans enforce strict limits of three two-year terms for all leadership posts except for the party leader
- Mitch McConnell has been party leader since 2007 and is expected to become the longest serving GOP leader with a 2020 reelection win
- The natural progression would be for all of the current leaders to receive promotions with a new face filling the vice chairman spot. However, with McConnell's expected reelection, the shuffle may prove more contentious as some of the current leaders will have to vacate their spot in the inner circle
