

President's party gain/loss of seats in House



President's party gain/loss of seats in Senate





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Historic polling of generic ballots suggests Democrats will gain seats in 2018, but will it be enough to flip the House?



Presidential job approval vs. midterm results since 1966













Breakdown of 2018 Senate races





Senate seats in play, by election year





Retirements from the Senate open seats to costly primaries and potentially contentious general elections

Senators retiring and not seeking reelection in 2018



Bob Corker (R-TN)

- Senator Corker has been an outspoken critic of President Trump
- Rep. Marsha Blackburn (R-TN) announced her candidacy
- Former Democratic TN governor Phil Bredesen (2003-2011) also announced his candidacy




Thad Cochran (R-MS)

- Appropriations Committee and has been absent from the Senate for long stretches over the past year
- His resignation means both of Mississippi's Senate seats will be on the ballot come November




Orrin Hatch (R-UT)

- Senator Hatch announced his retirement after initially deciding to run
- Former MA governor and presidential candidate Mitt Romney announced he was running for the open seat in mid-February







