

The states of health care: November 5th to 11th




Colorado: Hospitals are charging up to 31% more for in- and out-patient procedures than five other jurisdictions




- An analysis of health care costs in Colorado, Minnesota, Oregon, St. Louis, Maryland and Utah found that the price of inpatient care in Colorado was 31% higher than average
- The cost of outpatient care was 15% higher
- From 2009 through 2016, capital expenditures for hospitals in Colorado were higher than all other states except Alaska
- The Colorado Hospital Association pushed back against the analysis, saying that hospitals are being built in areas with rapid population growth and therefore have high demand for services
- The study also revealed that Colorado's hospitals costs were increasing at a faster rate compared to other jurisdictions

Illinois: Two insurers consolidated their health plans, reducing the number of Medicaid managed care insurers to six


New Hampshire: The state is improving its recovery-friendly workplace program to help employees with substance-use disorders



- New Hampshire Governor, Chris Sununu, announced the recovery-friendly workplace program last March
- The state is recruiting a program director, who will oversee the program
- The state legislature appropriated \$1 million to fund the new positions
- The initiative provides companies with a variety of free support measures, including prevention and training programs

Massachusetts: Two licensed cannabis testing laboratories have been given the "okay" to officially begin operations



- CDX Analytics in Salem and MCR Labs in Framingham were issued "commence full operations" notices by the Cannabis Control Commission
- This brings Massachusetts one step closer to recreational marijuana sales
- This announcement happened two years after Massachusetts residents voted to legalize marijuana
- The final step requires the commission to issue the same "commence full operations" notice to two dispensaries to sell recreational marijuana
- They have previously sold medical marijuana
