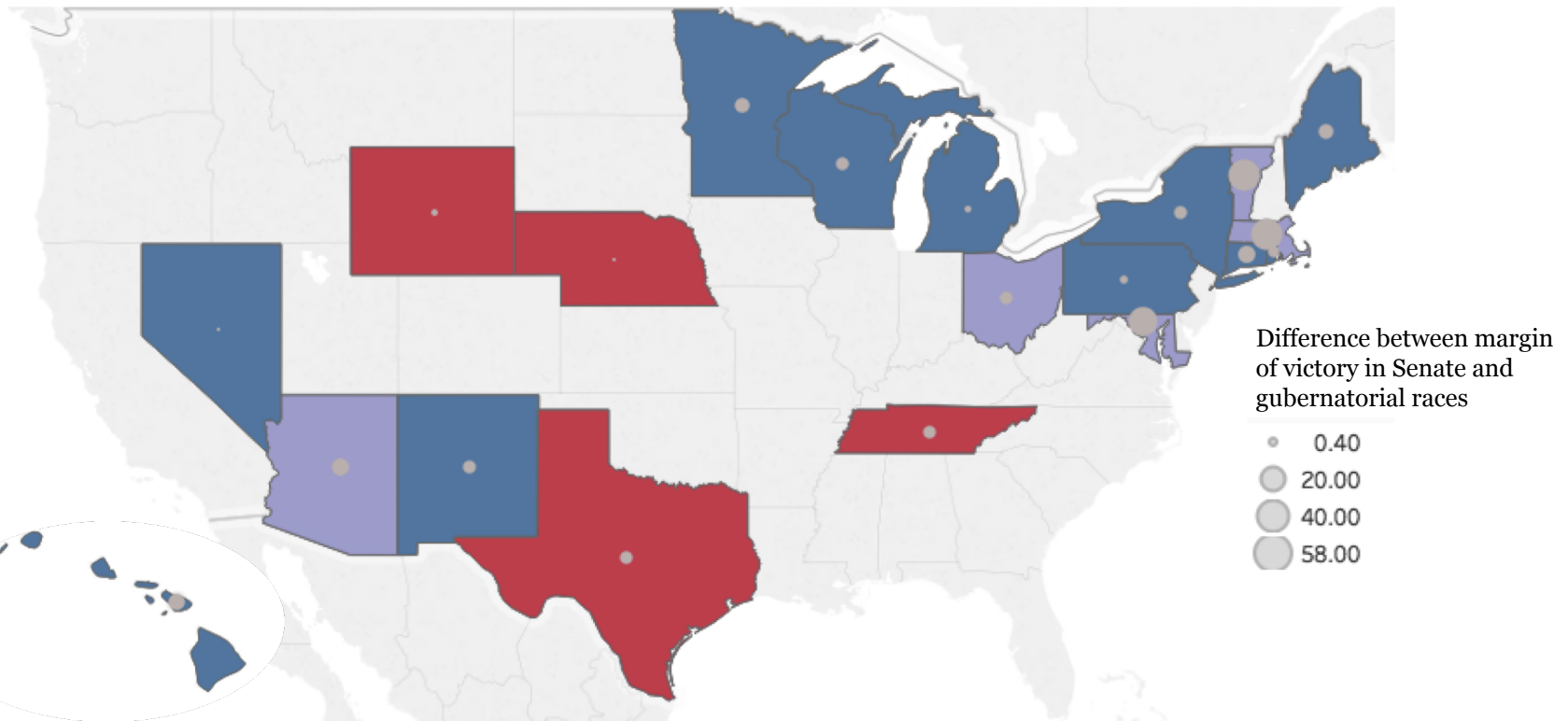


# Split-ticket voting in statewide races hit a new low in Senate and gubernatorial races this cycle

Differences between margin of victory in Senate and gubernatorial races, by state

- Democratic senator and governor
