Quick Summary

Former health insurance CEO with deep roots in Massachusetts public life; pro-business Republican whose close work with Democrats has earned him bipartisan credibility

- Tenure as America's highest rated governor has been marked by a focus on public health and progressive positions on LGBTQ rights, marijuana, minimum wage, and paid leave
- Shaped by an active family of well-connected conservatives and a liberal Democrat mother
- Ran a state policy think tank with his father, whose health care analyses caught the eye of future Massachusetts Gov. Bill Weld
- Appointed to state government positions, where he pushed cuts to social services and major infrastructure investments
- Significant private sector health care experience as CEO of Harvard Pilgrim, where he drove efficiency through increased premiums, outsourcing, contract restructuring, and workforce reduction
- Won governorship in 2014, combining Republican pro-business policies with left-ofcenter stances on social issues

Approach and Motivations

Measured consensus-builder who adheres to a pragmatic bipartisan approach

 Rejects partisan rhetoric, preferring a wonky style that sticks to the task at hand; sends letters deliberating policy measures rather than taking to media





- Seeks common ground with Democrats; chose an eclectic cabinet that included Democrats who disagreed with his policy positions on the campaign trail
- Anti-ideologue who sharpened his love for datadriven public policy and team-building approach while earning his MBA
- Selective in his opposition to President Trump; avoids direct confrontation but rather voices disagreement with policies like the travel ban and attempts to repeal the ACA

Policy Position and Areas of Focus

Focused on building a safe, productive state

Public Health: Works toward bipartisan reforms that address immediate health issues

- Privatized services and renegotiated physician contracts at state hospitals while at Mass. HHS
- Spearheaded the National Governor's Association's compact on opioids and served on the President's Commission on Opioids
- Instituted seven-day-supply limits, pushed opioid education and prescription oversight
- Instituted sick leave banks for federal workers
- Promotes access to health care through stable insurance markets and augmenting Medicaid

Infrastructure: Focused on better, cheaper transportation and housing for constituents

- Financial architect of the Big Dig, a behemoth state program to build highways, tunnels, and bridges; criticized for delay and overbudgeting
- Pushed a major \$18B bond bill to improve commuter rail and bridges and a \$3.9B bill to repair and improve public buildings

- Created an oversight board that fixed management problems in Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority
- Devoted to using or selling underutilized state land in a public housing program in 2015; started a \$100M fund for workforce housing
- Signed \$1.8B bill to partner with MassHousing to create affordable housing projects through state partnership, tax credits and subsidies
- Staunch proponent of his "Housing Choices" bill, which would give flexibility in loans and zoning requirements to local municipalities

Economics: Pro-growth Republican straining to balance budgets with state-funded programs

- Pushed earned-income tax credits, tax amnesty programs, and a \$610M economic development bill to leverage the 2017 federal tax cuts
- Despite anti-tax pledges, raised a payroll tax and cautiously supports a surtax on millionaires
- Created grants and incentive programs to bring General Electric's HQ to Boston; made a similarly strong bid for Amazon's second HQ

Core Communities

Prominent in the New England public sphere his entire life

Massachusetts Politicians: Worked closely with important lawmakers

- Mentored by Bill Weld, former Gov. of Massachusetts; Weld called him the "heart and soul" of his administration
- First boss in in Weld's administration was David Forsberg, now a family friend who chaired Baker's campaign and is active in public policy
- Strong relationship with former Gov. Paul Celluci, who wanted Baker as his running mate
- Often rallied with former Sen. Scott Brown





 Campaign donated \$141K to help elect friend Kevin Murphy, now Lowell City Manager

Massachusetts Political Community: Unending ties to key figures in civic life in his state

- Recommended to Weld by Pete Peters, wealthy oilman who founded the Pioneer Institute
- Close friends with state Republican operatives Rob Gray, Tim O'Leary, and Greg Lisciotti
- Mindy d'Arbeloff, former PR professional and now Baker staffer, is reportedly his oldest friend
- Appears often with prominent donor Chris Egan, former ambassador to the OECD
- Close with Dick Egan, an important political figure who served as ambassador to Ireland
- Howard Foley, longtime president of the Massachusetts High Technology Council (MHTC), was an important mentor
- Worked at MHTC with current president Chris Anderson, whom he engages on tech issues

Major Health Arena Players: Friendly with industry from his time as Harvard Pilgrim CEO

- Sat on the board of numerous health orgs, like Athena Health; attended summits with top industry leaders throughout the 2000s
- Prominent health care businessman Paul Levy helped appoint Baker to a hospital board
- Bruce Bullen took over at Pilgrim from Baker and is now COO of Blue Cross Mass.
- Tied to Robert Coughlin, chief executive of Massachusetts Biotechnology Council

Family and Personal Background

Public service runs in his blood

- Born in Elmira, NY, Baker grew up in Needham the eldest son (Charles Duane IV) of a family prominent in New England public life
- Great-grandfather was a federal prosecutor and assemblyman; grandfather was a renowned Newburyport politician
- Father served in multiple positions in the Nixon and Reagan administrations, including as Under Secretary of HHS; earned his MBA from Harvard, was a professor of business policy at Northeastern University, and worked with Charlie at Pioneer
- Childhood marked by what he called the nightly "laser light show" of fierce political debate among his parents, brothers, himself and frequent guests; Charlie would bring books with references to dinner

Personal life

- Met his wife-Lauren Cardy Schadt, the daughter of former Cadbury Schweppes President & CEO, James Schadt – at Kellogg business school
- Big Star Wars and music fan
- When he was 25, he wrote a lengthy letter to his idol, Bruce Springsteen, expressing his disappointment in the depressing nature of The Boss's most recent album, Nebraska

Criticisms and Controversies

Criticized during 2014 campaign for repeating a false story

False memory of fisherman story

- During a critical debate in late October before being elected Governor, Baker told a story about a meeting that moved him to tears
- The story involved a fisherman whose sons were offered college scholarships for football but could not attend because they needed to help the family business
- The story was later revealed to be false and Baker apologized for getting the details wrong
